# TRUSTEES' REPORT for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

# Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are to provide accommodation, support and services for those in the Crawley area suffering the effects of homelessness, unemployment, loneliness, discrimination, or other forms of social exclusion. These objects have not changed in the year. Our support is available to anyone in need.

#### Public benefit

The Trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when setting our aims and objectives and in planning out future activities. We believe that we meet the criteria for Public Benefit.

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

## Charitable activities

The last year has been another very busy and successful one with continuing very high demand for our services.

#### Riverside House

The hostel and day centre at Riverside House is the heart of Crawley Open House where we have our 24 bed hostel and operate a 7 day-a-week day centre.

The occupancy of the hostel again exceeded 99%, and it is sad that we have to turn away requests for a room every day because we are full.

The day centre offers inexpensive food, hot drinks and shelter to every visitor. For those who need them, it also offers general advice, housing and resettlement support, mental health and substance misuse support and counselling, as well as a visiting doctor, chiropodist and hairdresser. More than 16,993 visits were made to the day centre during the year.

We attach great importance to helping clients find more permanent accommodation suitable to their needs, and during the year we were able to resettle 116 in this way. It was encouraging to see 55% of the hostel residents successfully moved on to longer term accommodation.

## Move On

Providing Move-On accommodation is a key part of our work to help people to move successfully into rented accommodation. We continue to manage three move-on houses, providing a total of 12 bedrooms. We aim to offer the rooms for a period of 12 to 24 months at a relatively low rent, to give the occupants a chance to save for a deposit while improving their skills through education, retraining or reskilling.

## **Local Assistance Network**

Local Assistance Network (LAN) is the scheme operated by West Sussex County Council (WSCC) to provide emergency support to local residents in times of crisis or acute need. Crawley Open House works with WSCC to deliver this service to the Crawley area.

With the use of LAN funds, we are able to provide food parcels, gas and electricity top-ups, train and coach fares, furniture and white goods to those with an urgent need. We have also teamed up with the Crawley Easter Team to extend the number of people reached by LAN. During the year, we used LAN to help more than 500 people.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

#### Outreach Team

Outreach is becoming an increasingly important part of our work with Crawley Borough Council and WSCC. We were delighted to secure funding until March 2017 for our street Outreach Team, which aims to make contact with entrenched street drinkers and people displaying anti-social behaviour to offer them help, advice and empathy. We also had funding during the year for a Resettlement Outreach Worker, to work with clients in temporary accommodation to help them find somewhere more permanent and with clients in permanent accommodation to support them in retaining their tenancy. This funding ceased in March 2016, but we have taken the decision as trustees to continue funding the work from our reserves.

We are also delighted to have secured funding from a group comprised of the CCG, Sussex Police, Safer Crawley Partnership and West Sussex County Council for a trial of dual diagnosis outreach work. This will start in May 2016 and run for a year, seeking to help clients with both mental health and substance abuse issues.

## Work at Riverside House

We continued our rolling programme of work to refurbish Riverside House to ensure that it meets the needs of our clients and staff. During the year, we replaced the old CCTV system with a modern internet based system, giving much better images which can be viewed remotely.

We also improved the entrance to Riverside to make it more welcoming and refurbished the Project Workers office to create an attractive, modern environment.

# Fundraising activities

Crawley Open House is very grateful to all those who support our work with gifts of money, food, clothing and other useful items. We receive gifts from hundreds of individuals, schools, churches, community organisations, companies and charities and we are greatly encouraged by this practical support from the community in Crawley, Sussex and further afield.

Last year set a new record for donations, with a total of £122,626 being received. This figure included gifts of food which we estimate saved us £60,000.

The highlight of the year's fundraising was the Big Sleep Out held in October in central Crawley. The weather was kind to us, and over 30 supporters, staff and trustees slept out for the night under the band stand in Queens Square. Their sponsorship raised over £10,000 for Crawley Open House. Thank you everyone!

# FINANCIAL REVIEW

# Financial position

During the year the charity has had net incoming resources of £93,770 (2014/15: £24,886) as shown on the statement of financial activities on page 8 of the accounts. The increased surplus reflected the very high level of donations in the year, an unplanned long term staff vacancy and one -off recovery of over-paid expenses from previous years. The trustees do not expect these favourable items to recur in 2016-17 and therefore expect that the financial result for next year will be much closer to break even.

All of the charity assets are held for the furtherance of the charity's objectives. The charity is heavily reliant on voluntary assistance which amounted to around 2,700 hours during the year.

## Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds to cover three to six months' expenditure. As at 31st March 2016, unrestricted funds were close to the top of this range. The trustees consider this to be an appropriate level of reserves given the increasing financial pressure on the local authorities and other organisations from which we receive a large part of our funding. It is also the policy of the charity to build up a designated fund to a level representing the value of the occupied property.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

## **FUTURE PLANS**

Our priorities for the current year include setting up our new dual diagnosis outreach team and continuing to provide our current outreach services.

Following discussion with WSCC, we will extend our Local Assistance Network (LAN) coverage to include families with children over age four. Previously we have provided LAN support only for clients without children.

We will continue with the maintenance and renewal programme for Riverside House.

We will continue to develop the training programme for our staff, as part of our commitment to ensure that they have the skills and knowledge required for their demanding roles.

The trustees also intend to review the approach to fund raising, and to look for new sources of funds. They are very aware of the financial pressures on local government, and have already seen some of our funding from that source cut or restricted in its use. If possible they wish to ensure that Crawley Open House has sufficient secure long term funding to plan more than a year ahead.

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Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

# 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015)', the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

## Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations and similar incoming resources are included in the year in which they are receivable which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

Grants are included in the accounting period to which they relate.

Activities in furtherance of charitable objects includes rental income and is included in the year in which it is receivable which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

Other incoming resources includes kitchen receipts, placement fees and a refund of overcharged expenses all of which are included in the accounts when the charity becomes entitled to the resources.

# Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

# Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the charitable company's activities. These costs have been allocated between the different charitable activities. The bases on which support costs have been allocated are set out in note 7.

# Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

- Straight line over 50 years

Fixtures and fittings Motor vehicles

- 33% on cost

Motor vehicles
Computer equipment

- 25% straight line

- 33% on cost

Freehold Land is not depreciated.

It has been decided by the Trustees that only items of a value of £1,000 and over will be capitalised as anything smaller is not deemed material.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unregistered funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

# Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

## Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

## **Donated goods**

There are considerable gifts of food given to the charity which have been estimated at £60,000 (2015: £25,000) for the year.

#### Debtors

Other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

# Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

## **Transition to FRS 102**

No accounting policies have changed as a result of the adoption of the new Charities FRSSE Sorp but governance costs have now been included within support costs and allocated to each of the main charitable activities. This has changed the way 2015's statement of financial activities is shown but has not impacted on the overall surplus or deficit made in the previous year.
