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TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2012.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, does not have a share capital and was incorporated on 21 April 1995. The trustees/directors are appointed at the annual general meeting or during the year at trustees' meetings.

Crawley Open House has charitable status and its charity registration number is 1048919.

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £10 in the event of a winding up.

The trustees have been examining the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems are established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity are to provide accommodation and support for the homeless in the Crawley area. These objects have not changed in the year.

Achievements and performance

The first words that came to my mind when thinking of writing this report were 'moving on'. This is clearly relevant when we think of our client group. One of our main aims is to support clients in the process of moving on in their lives, It also relates to the service we provide towards that aim.

This last year has seen a clear development in our aim to move on as an organisation. Our plans to increase the office and working space have come to fruition during the year and work commenced to increase significantly the space at Riverside House by the addition of a first floor on part of the adult hostel and day centre. The plans were to provide additional offices for resettlement, health care and our counsellors. It will also house our administration team and provide a training/meeting area as well as an additional surgery. The work commenced in October and was drawing to a close at the end of the financial year. As I write this report the office space is now being fully used and what an improvement it is. So many thanks are due to the many individuals and organisations who helped finance this much needed work.



TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

The year has also seen the ongoing vital work at the Riverside House hostel. During the year the occupancy rate was again extremely high at 98.9%. It is sad to report again that it was necessary to turn away 1,936 applicants during the year as we were full, but we were able to resettle 123. It was encouraging to see 50% of the residents successfully moved on to settled accommodation.

Move On

Moving people on successfully is a key aspect of our service. The 'move on' accommodation at Southgate has proved so important, and during the year 5 of the residents were able to move to settled accommodation. We feel so positive about the value of the move on accommodation that we have begun to think about how we can develop that aspect of our service.

Southwell Lodge

Housing 16 to 18 year old young people at Southwell Lodge has been an important development of Open House in recent years. During the year this 10 bed space high support hostel has moved on 11 young people to settled accommodation. On arrival 70% of the young people were not in education or training but during the year 100% of them took part in education or training.

Riverside House

The hostel building at Riverside House also accommodates the day centre. The services provided within the day centre include general advice, resettlement, mental health support, counselling, substance misuse issues, a community psychiatric nurse and other medical services including a doctor and chiropodist. In the current economic climate the day centre is proving so important in offering support to people in need and 16,357 people used this service during the year.

Thank you

Many thanks are due to so many people for the continuing service provided by the staff at Open House. Firstly, thanks to those individuals and organisations who provide resources for the project including finance, furniture and food etc. We are so grateful for this essential support. I would also like to thank the Trustees and members of the Management Committee who oversee the project. Peter Mansfield-Clark the Director and Charlie Arratoon the Deputy Director lead a dedicated staff team. Many thanks to Peter, Charlie and the staff for their commitment to working in a service that can at times be very challenging. In addition we value so much the role of volunteers and are grateful for their contribution to the success of the project.

The project is definitely moving on positively and we look ahead to the next year when we plan a major review of the service to ensure that we are most effectively meeting the needs of the clients of Open House.

Public Benefit

We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

Financial review

During the year the charity has had net incoming resources of £75,144 (2011 £102,976) as shown on the statement of financial activities on page 5 of the accounts. All of the charity assets are held for the furtherance of the charity's objectives. The charity is heavily reliant on voluntary assistance which amounts to around 7,280 hours a year.

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds to cover approximately three to six months' expenditure. The Trustees are aware that at present the unrestricted fund falls below this criteria and are taking steps to increase the level of this fund. It is also the policy of the charity to build up a designated fund to a level representing the value of the occupied property.

Asset cover for funds

Note 14 sets out an analysis of the assets attributable to the various funds and a description of the trusts. These assets are sufficient to meet the charity's obligations on a fund by fund basis.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations and similar incoming resources are included in the year in which they are receivable which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

Grants are included in the accounting period to which they relate.

The main source of income relating to rental is included in the year in which it is receivable which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is included as incurred.

Costs are attributable between the different types of expenditure on an actuals basis.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Freehold land is not depreciated

Straight line over 50 years

Computer equipment

33% straight line

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

33% straight line

Motor vehicles

33% straight line

It has been decided by the Trustees that only items of a value of £1,000 and over will be capitalised as anything smaller is not deemed material.

1.5 Taxation

The charity is not subject to corporation tax or any other taxes on income or gains arising from its charitable objectives.

1.6 Donated gifts

There are considerable gifts of food given to the charity which have been estimated at £25,000 for the year. This has been reflected in the accounts by introducing income and expenditure to this value.
